have been around horses for most of my life, having competed in various ridden disciplines, including showing and showjumping. Douglas started riding at the age of 26, first at a riding school and later buying a horse of his own. After a long break from riding between 2003 and 2014, due to work commitments, we decided it was time to get back into horses.

I had been given a 'try carriage driving' day at Bennington Carriages as a birthday present in the spring of 2014, and I enjoyed it so much I decided I wanted to learn more. Douglas and I were due to go back to Bennington in the spring of 2015 and by coincidence, Sonny was going to be there. He said he'd bring Joey along for us to try, with no obligation to buy. Sonny was very honest and he was as keen to find the right pony for us as we were.

Mine and Douglas's biggest concern at that time was that we had never owned a carriage driving horse before. Plus, Joey was only five and had only recently been broken to harness. However, on that day at Bennington, when we first tried him out, it was blowing a gale, yet little Joey just trotted around the arena like he owned the place. We fell in love with him immediately so Joey arrived at our place three weeks later and our wonderful journey began.

As novice drivers, Douglas and I didn't want to ruin Joey so we invested a lot of time in lessons with Sue Mart at Bennington to begin with. Sue is an
