Learning to DRIVE

In the first of our three part feature on learning to drive, we speak to Christine and Douglas McLeod who took up driving together in 2014 after a break from being involved with horses. In part two and three we explore how they have progressed and goals they have achieved.

hristine and Douglas live in Leicestershire and decided to get back into enjoying horses together and carriage driving seemed to be the perfect option for them, allowing them to both learn something new together at the same time, as well as being safe and fun.

Christine works as a road safety professional and started riding at 11 years old and enjoyed competing in various disciplines including showing and show jumping whereas Douglas, a dentist, was not introduced to horses until after he had completed his studies at 26. He started off with going to a riding school at weekends and soon after purchased his first horse and had a lot of fun attending local events and beach rides. However, due to work commitments the pair had no involvement with horses from 2003 to 2014.

Christine and Douglas both agreed that they needed to be surrounded with like-minded people and to immerse themselves in learning from quality coaches and their vast experience and knowledge. After many hours of research and receiving excellent recommendations, they were led to attend a 'Try Driving' day held at the Bennington Carriages Academy, which was a birthday present for Christine in the spring of 2014.

"It was a brilliant day and ticked so many boxes for us, but we realised that if we intended to do the job properly then our learning curve was going to be immense; we needed it to be fun and as safe as possible, a tricky balance," said Christine.

The pair spent the rest of 2014 going to events and shows to gain a better understanding of the sport and even

had the option of starting a pony from scratch, but soon realised that this would not be the best option for themselves; yet finding the right one for them was going to be equally as difficult.

After many hours trawling through online adverts and telephone calls, the McLeod's finally found 'Joey' advertised and contacted Sonny Hillier straight away. "Sonny was very open and honest with us and we were under no pressure to buy; we were very concerned not to make a mistake in purchasing the wrong pony for us. However, Sonny came highly recommended so we had confidence that if Joey was not suitable for us he would find a pony that was," said Douglas, who added: "We had waited a long time to be able to get involved with horses again and venture into the world of carriage driving so we needed to get it right."

Douglas and Christine decided to go back to Bennington for another 'Try Driving' day in the spring of 2015 where they enjoyed a "fantastic" day gaining more of an insight into what is involved and building on their previous visit with so much still to learn, but relishing every moment. By coincidence, Sonny was also working with Sue Mart that day and had kindly agreed to bring Joey along for them to try at the end of the day.

"We fell in love with Joey. He was a superstar and buying him was the easiest decision we have ever made; Joey is everything we could have wished for and more and we were so happy to have found our pony at last! Sue agreed to be our coach and it was very evident that the driving bug had well and truly bitten us and we were loving every minute of it," said Christine.

Why train with Sue?

Christine and Douglas decided to train with Sue after getting involved and attending two of the 'Try Driving' days at Bennington Carriages Academy. "Know, like and trust comes to mind; Sue is genuinely interested in what we want to achieve and her passion for all aspects and levels of the sport is immense," said Douglas.

Sue is also a UK CC level three coach.

The Academy's popular 'Try Driving' days give an overview on carriage driving, such as fitting harness, rein handling and having a go at driving. As Christine and
